Greetings Lions of District 24-C,

It is hard to believe that my Lion year is ending in about a month. With all the Covid-19 restrictions, we look at the many services the Lions in the District have performed for their communities. To date, 725 projects, serving 89,604 people. This statistic is only reporting approximately 50% of our clubs. Again, I will stress the need for our clubs to enter their service in LCI. Now, that we are beginning "to see the light at the end of the tunnel," I am looking forward to having all clubs back to meeting, working to increase membership, doing service projects, and engaging in fundraising.

Our membership growth has lagged this year, but I am appreciative of your efforts in continuing to recruit 97 new Lions to date and increased gender parity to almost 35%. The NAMI Committee will continue under a new name, Global Membership Approach, next year. The members of our District committee, under the leadership of NAMI Champion, IPDG John Seaborn, have worked to evaluate and make plans to strengthen our clubs and to plan development of new clubs in our district. The work of this Committee will be continued next year by DGE Eric Mills. If you have an interest and want to make a difference in growing Lionism, please contact me.

Our District support of the LCIF Campaign 100 has been slow this year. In spite of many club fundraisers having to be cancelled this year, we have collected to date \$11,010 from 41 donors with 25 clubs represented. The Campaign 100 Collection Boxes have been distributed to the clubs and I encourage you to drop your spare pocket or pocketbook change into them at each meeting. Each donation, no matter how small will help someone who is in need.

I want to thank you all for the wonderful support of my Hope to Walk project. The purchase of a "leg" for \$250 can truly transform the life of an amputee in a developing country. Reported in May, we have collected \$14,750 for 59 legs with 21 clubs represented. At present, the Smith Mountain Lake club leads the District in the number of "legs" purchased with 24 and the Wytheville club follows with 6. I am honored that the Lions have played a part in this great service.

Over this "different" and challenging year, my visits to your clubs were in all formats; zoom, conference call, and in person. I really enjoyed being with you and appreciated all of your support in keeping a strong leonine presence alive. Again, Lions THANK YOU for all of your help and support during this most unusual and challenging year and to celebrate the success we have achieved. As my slogan has been this year, "TOGETHER" we SERVE, we GROW, and we SHARE!

I am looking forward to continued service in our District and to support DGE Eric Mills in achieving a year of many successes.

District Governor, Jean is a native of Pennsylvania who has lived in Wytheville, VA for over 40 years. She retired as Director of Materials Management in 2011 from Wythe County Community Hospital after 33 years of service. Her hobbies include gardening, jigsaw puzzles, family ancestry, and many sports, especially, the Tennessee Volunteers. She is a member of Mt. Pleasant United Methodist Church in Wytheville and serves as Treasurer, Finance Committee Chair, member of the United Methodist Women, maintains the church landscape, and sings in the choir. She is a VFW Lifetime Member and a member of the Wythe County Historical Society.

Since joining the Wytheville Lions in 2009 from the encouragement of a close Lion friend, she found the work of the Lions to be very rewarding and beneficial to the local community; as well, as the world. Highlight of her service to the community was the development of the Memorial Day Flag Placement Project in 2012. At present, the Wytheville Lions Club is providing over 900 flags in 34 cemeteries in Wythe County each Memorial Day.

During 2016-2017, Lion Jean served as the first female President of the Wytheville Club in its 75 Years of existence. Her leadership brought different perspectives to the club; especially in being instrumental in increasing the female membership of the club.

Her work in Lions continued to the District holding the positions of Zone chair, various District chairs, and the VDGs. During that time she started the first Leo Club in the Wythe County Schools, continues as the Club Advisor, and the District Leo Club Chair promoting the involvement of youth in Lions.

The Corona pandemic has changed the way we live our lives and the way we SERVE, but the District Governor Jean is challenging Lions to continue their service safely because our service is needed NOW more than ever.

Bland, the greatest African American writer of American Folk Song, who composed over seven hundred songs. He most famous song is "Carry Me Back to Ole Virginny". This song was the Virginia State Song from 1940 to 1997. The Annual Bland Music Scholarship Program was established in 1948 by Lions of Virginia to recognize James Bland and to assist and promote cultural and educational opportunities for the musically talented youth of Virginia. Over \$25,000 is awarded annually in state, regional, district and local clubs.





The first place vocalist at the local contest was Emery Maxson, shown on the left, who sang "Talk to the Animals" and the first place instrumentalist was Preston Pauley, shown on the right, who performed "October" on the piano. Dublin Lions Club News

Dublin Lions have had a hard blow during the pandemic. Like most other clubs, fund raising has been albeit eliminated due to COVID. Dublin has traditionally held two major fundraisers in the form of a Flea Market. These two Flea Markets generally net the club around \$65,000.00 in revenue that allows the club to support a wide array of community needs through our fiscal support.

COVID did not stop the Dublin Lions in their service to the community.



In March and May of 2021, Dublin Lions hosted their Bloodmobiles at the clubhouse. The March Blood-drive netted about 34 units of blood. The Bloodmobile in May collected 38 units of blood. Combined we collected 72 units. American Red Cross reports that for every unit of blood collected three lives are impacted.

While Dublin Lions have not been able to do a lot of fundraising, the membership has stepped up at every meeting since August by digging deep into their own pockets to help ensure that Daily Bread of Pulaski VA would receive a portion of our usual support. From August 2020 to May 2021, Dublin Lions collected \$1,250.00 in cash donations.



Starting at our May meeting Dublin Lions have committed to collecting 1 ton of canned food for Daily Bread. At the May membership meeting members collected 45 large cans of food for the Daily Bread. Approximately 250 lbs. of food. Daily Bread feeds approximately 125 people daily. Most of the people they serve suffer from mental illness.



Nine Lions gathered at the Pulaski County Fairgrounds on May 1, 2021 to work on our stretch of Route 100 for our Adapt-a Highway program. Sixteen bags of trash were picked up by our members.



Additionally, Dublin Lions collected over 453 pairs of eyeglasses which was taken to the Eyeglass Recycling Center in Roanoke, VA.

Aside from being Cabinet Meeting day, MD 24 C Lions gathered at the Eyeglass Recycling Center in Roanoke to conduct the last cabinet meeting of the Lion's year. As soon as District Governor Jean Cook called the meeting to order, the cabinet broke into song and sang Happy Birthday to District Governor Jean. District Governor Jean reflected on the fact that exactly one year ago she was elected as District Governor and today represents the end of a most difficult year.



The first order of business was the presentation of two checks to Hope to Walk. Through the advocacy of District Governor Jean, PCC Rick Carroll, and Lion Jay Furick, our district solicited \$250.00 donations from individuals and clubs and the result yielded 59 prosthetic legs for a total of \$14, 750.00 for the first check. Secondly, District Governor Jean performed budget magic and provided Hope to Walk a second check for \$1,500.00 to purchase kitchen appliances for their clinic that will be built in Guatemala.



After the presentation, everyone came together for a photo opportunity to memorialize the moment. Currently an effort to obtain funding from LCIF, Bethlehem United Methodist Church, and individual donors, a goal to raise \$100,000.00 to build a clinic in Guatemala is in the works.
